


Year 2 We are reading The Marvellous Granny Jinks and me.




If you are enjoying the story you may want to read the next book in the series: The Marvellous Granny Jinks and me– Animal Magic!

If you are enjoying this book, why not try another in the series?




What could you read at home?


Last week we held the first of our Reading Recommendations assemblies. Each term all the teachers will suggest books that the children might want to take home from our class libraries. Find out below what the teachers recommend.

<u>Year 1</u>

There's a Snake in the School by David Walliams.

A very funny and exciting story about a child called Miranda who brings her friendly snake to school for 'bring your pet day'. However, the Head Mistress decides that there should be no pets in her school and locks them all away. Will Miranda, and the other children, ever get their pets back?






Sharing a Shell by Julia Donaldson.

A touching and funny story about sharing and friendship. It is full of magical rhyming words and glittery illustrations. In this story the characters work well in a team, each doing their own job to keep their little worlds running smoothly and it highlights the important role that sharing plays in building lasting friendships.

The Proudest Blue by Ibtihaj Muhammad and S.K. Ali

It's Faizah's first day of school, and her older sister Asiya's first day of hijab – made of a beautiful blue fabric. This is an uplifting, universal story of new experiences, the unbreakable bond shared by siblings and of being proud of who you are .


adventure to a secret island, just for the two of them.


The illustrations are really colourful and I love the magical world that is created by the author. The main characters seem to be having so much fun, like I would always have with my own Grandad.

Charlie and the Chocolate Factory by Roald Dahl
