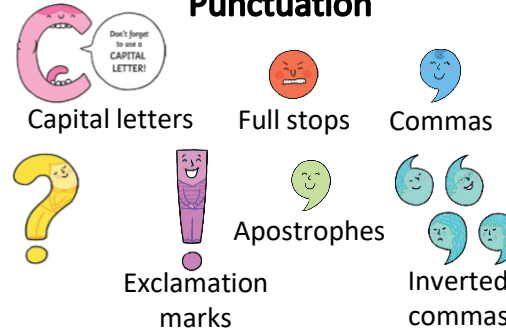


### Key Vocabulary

<b>commas</b>	Commas can be used to separate items in a list or after a fronted adverbial.	
<b>verb inflection was and were</b>	Was is used in the first person and the third person e.g. <i>I was tired, He was hungry.</i> Were is used in the second person and for plural e.g. <i>You were amazing, They were excited.</i>	
<b>determiners</b>	Are used before a noun to show which noun you mean e.g. <i>the, a, an, which, what, whose, this, those, these, that</i>	
<b>possessive pronoun</b>	A possessive pronoun is used to show that something belongs to someone. <i>him, her, he, she, hers, them, they</i>	
<b>fronted adverbials</b>	Gives an indication of when something happened or how. After an adverbial phrase, we use a comma	
<b>Time</b> Today, Yesterday, In June, After dusk,  <i>Recently</i> , I have started squinting	<b>Location</b> Over the mountain, In the distance, In the house, Around the corner,  <i>On the boat</i> , we had a quiet picnic.	<b>Feelings/manner</b> Anxiously, Suddenly, Nervously, Curiously,  <i>Joyfully</i> , she opened her gifts.

### Punctuation

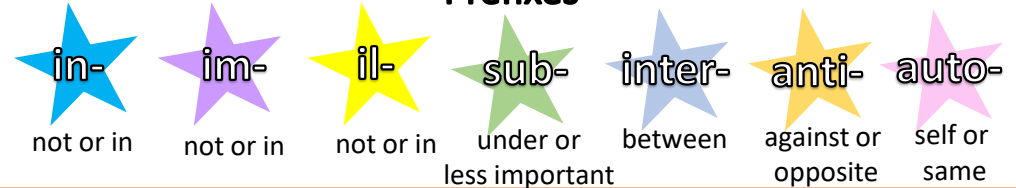


### Inverted Commas

Inverted commas indicate direct speech. A comma is used after the reporting clause and direct speech ends with punctuation.

The conductor shouted, "Sit down!"
